BLOOD SCARE!



Rumors abound regarding allegations of tainted blood in the blood banks of Kissimmee. After three patients were admitted with flu-like symptoms, it was discovered that all had received blood transfusions from the OneBlood collection center, located on John Young Parkway. The hospital immediately pulled all donated products from the center and put them in isolation. Further tests are being run to identifv what is in these blood donations.

specialist with the Center for Disease Control, is to head up the investigation of the donations. "While we at the CDC have no comment regarding OneBlood and its collection practices, we have asked the center to halt collections until all units can be inspected for taint."

Local hospitals throughout Osceola county and extending as far North as Holden Heights and the Millenia area have followed suit and pulled all blood products shipped in by One-Blood. Other banks are scrambling to provide supplies to those hospitals who relied heavily on OneBlood donations. "This is a sad and worrisome day," said Dr. Kyle Drummision, a pediatric surgeon. "We've had to reroute patients with complex surgeries, on the off chance they may need more blood than we have on hand."

Speculations surrounds the street drug called "Elite" and it's knock-off called "Elusive" for the blood scare. However, several doctors have discounted this possible link to the infection.

"Elite and Elusive were not found in the samples tested by the CDC," countered Dr. Rosenthaw. "We will continue to monitor the situation and provide whatever assistance we can."

Local officials are rejoicing in this victory in the war on drugs. Due to an anonymous tip, police officers were asked to pull over any delivery-type vehicles. What they found in the back was disturbing.

In an unexpected turn of events, the once-beloved neighborhood watch group know as NIOT, or "Not In Our Town" appears to have left its peace loving ways behind. Shots rang out in the downtown club district during what was believed to be a peaceful NIOT protest, leaving three dead and six seriously wounded.

Another instance of unexpected violence from a NIOT crown occurred two days later at both Sky360 and I-Bar. Peaceful protests of the continued presence of the Elite drug turned into murder as a firefight began. This time, leaving four dead and seven wounded.

"These senseless deaths are a tragedy," Detective Harmony Croseth replied. "Orlando Police continue to urge everyone to stay in groups with only those you know and trust, while traveling through downtown. Not everyone wearing an

ELITE PRANK?

Local police are stumped as to how a formula for the street drug "Elite" ended up on billboards throughout the Central Florida area. The moment they were discovered, authorities immediately went about dismantling them. A press release was issued from the Orlando Police Department, discouraging the public from attempting to use the formula to create anything, claiming the formula was a hoax, and any compound created with this formula would be a deadly mistake.

An anonymous source confirmed the above mentioned statement, but only in part. In fact, part of the formula appears to have been real. It described a particular ingredient which is unavailable in the State of Florida. Without this ingredient, the chemical created by the formula will not produce the desired effect.

The false Elite has been dubbed "Elusive" by clubgoers. So named due to users of he drug attempting to chase the 'elusive' high created by Elite and never quite managing to reach it.

"This particular combination includes what's essentially a massive dose of caffeine, causing blood vessels to dilate and the pulse to race and the blood pressure to rise to unsafe levels. Those



OPERA HOUSE SCHEME?

Outrage flew across the internet news sites as allegations of incorrect money management and faulty design sparked concern throughout the Art Community. "If it's true that the Scarpone brothers were nothing more than modern gangsters, we cannot, in good conscious, allow the opera house project to continue."

"I'm horrified," said local Jessica Milstone. "I was so happy that an actual Opera house was being built, but I can't take my children to a place built on blood and drug money. What kind of example will I set for them that way?"

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ROGERS BUILDING FINDS A NEW HOME BY BUFF SPIKEY

The Rogers Building, also known as The English Club, has found a new home. Added to the U.S. **Register of Historic Places** in 1983, the purchase of such a cherished structure is both a joy and a fear to many in the city. Given the inclusion of such megacorps such as Altrex Corp and Parabolic Industries, many fear that Orlando's focus was too much on the future and too little on the past.

"The private investor who picked up this property was very persuasive, and presented a case for purchase that was very hard to deny," said Deborah Joshly, a member of the U.S. Historic Registry. "This individual assures us that the building will remain true to its original state. It's one of the main reasons we decided upon this investor over other offers."

Indeed, it seems that Parabolic Industries was one of many investment firms looking at the Rogers Building before its sold. Parabolic, known for refurbishing and restoring impossibly damaged properties, declined to comment on the sale.

However, not everyone is pleased with those who purchased the lovely building.

A protest occurred outside the building some weeks ago, sponsored by the Family Values Commission. The protest was due OT REPORTER largely to the death of Viv-

ka Mendoza, a high school student who died due to an overdose of Elite right outside the building. Sources close to the Mendoza family claim that Vivika frequented the building in order to score this drug from dealers in the area. Indeed, one Elite dealer was arrested near the location where Vivika was found.

Paston Renny has been using the footsteps of the building as a protest and rally point. "Not In Our Town! Not in Our Town!" has been the rallying cheer, with protesters talking up the historic nature of the building and protesting it's use to peddle sin.
